Manuscripts are handwritten compositions on materials like **paper**, **bark**, **or palm leaves**, often dating back at least **75 years**, and carrying significant scientific, historical, or aesthetic value. Some examples include:

- **Bakhshali Manuscript** (third or fourth century A.D.), an ancient Indian mathematical text that is considered one of the earliest examples of the use of zero.
- Manuscripts cover diverse themes such as **history**, **religion**, **literature**, **astrology**, **and agricultural practices**.

Notably, India possesses an estimated 10 million manuscripts in around 80 ancient scripts, including Brahmi, Kushan, Gaudi, Lepcha, and Maithili.

• 75% of these manuscripts are in Sanskrit, while 25% are in regional languages.

Other Initiatives for Manuscript Conservation in India:

- 1. National Manuscripts Mission (NMM):
- Launched in **2003** by the **Ministry of Tourism and Culture**, this initiative focuses on locating and preserving manuscripts across India.
- 1. National Library of India, Kolkata:
- The library houses around 3,600 rare and historically significant manuscripts.
